KELSO TRAIN STATION REMODELED

The Kelso Depot , as it is officially known, was built in 1924 to serve as a train stop and quarters for crew. The last scheduled passenger train passed through Kelso in 1997.

Kelso was where the Salt Lake Line met the Los Angeles Railroad, and where extra engines were parked. The extra engines were needed to help getting the trains up the steep grade of the Cima Hills. The location was also perfect as a stop for refreshments for both passengers and then steam engines. Hungry passengers could enjoy a meal at the restaurant, while the steam engines would get a fresh drink of water.
